**Tuesday, June 15, 2010**

**Young Adults Gather for Pre-Conference Kick Off**

More than 50 young adults gathered at the Two Story Coffee House in Athens Tuesday night to fellowship and to get acclimated before Annual Conference officially began. Bishop Mike Watson and Margaret Watson stopped by to greet the young adults.

**Online Registration: An unqualified success**

The registration process was simple this year thanks to the new online registration process, which kept lines and confusion to a minimum. A total of 2,329 delegates pre-registered online. As of Thursday afternoon, 184 delegates registered and paid on site.

**Wednesday, June 16, 2010**

**Laity Orientation**

The praise band from Toccoa First UMC performed as participants in the Laity Orientation session gathered Wednesday morning. Athens Host Committee member Johnny Fowler welcomed the group, Conference Youth president Emily Hinson opened with prayer, and Lay Leader Jane Finley led the orientation. Highlights included:

- Laity celebrated the 669 churches that paid 100 percent apportionments.

**Bishop Watson preaches opening worship service**

The 144th Session of the North Georgia Annual Conference opened with worship and a sermon by Bishop B. Michael Watson. The service was led by Barbara Day Miller, a deacon in the North Georgia Conference and assistant dean of worship and music at Candler School of Theology. Bishop Watson preached on Genesis 28:10-19, challenging members of the conference to wake up and see where God is moving in our land, in this place.

"Are you willing? Are you ready? Are you able?" he asked. "Because the power of the Holy Spirit is among us."

Bishop Watson identified many of the issues that can create barriers within the church, including differences in size, political leanings, finances, ethnicity, culture and social issues. "But Jesus Christ came to transcend all those barriers," he said.

He emphasized our mission as United Methodists to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. "It is absolutely vital that we fulfill our mission to make disciples for Jesus Christ," said Bishop Watson. "God wants to do the extraordinary and tag—you're it."

**Central Conference Pension Initiative**

This year's Annual Conference Mission Offering—which brought in \$121,600 as of Friday—will go to the Central Conference Pension Initiative (CCPI), the denominational campaign to fully fund pensions for retired clergy and surviving spouses who have served in conferences outside the United States. Bishop Watson announced that CCPI recently reached its initial goal of \$20 million. This year's offering will help CCPI to reach its next goal of \$25 million. ### **Treasurer's Report (Part 1)**

Keith Cox, Conference Treasurer, presented the first component of the Treasurer's Report. Highlights included:

- 2010 Membership - 356,279 (up 2,185)
- Professions of Faith - 6,622
- Average Attendance - 127,547 (down 3,323)
- 669 churches paid 100 percent apportionments in 2010.
- District with the highest apportionments paid: Athens-Elberton District which paid 93.4 percent.

Cox acknowledged four of the primary fiscal challenges this year:

- Unfunded liabilities - \$90 million
- Simpsonwood
- Lack of Conference Reserves
- Declining Apportionment Payment Percentages

### **Interim Report of the Annual Conference Task Force**

Henry Bowden, chair of the Annual Conference Task Force, presented initial findings of the task force. The 17-member group divided major tasks into two groups, the Simpsonwood Retreat and Conference Center and other issues relating to ministerial compensation.

They first focused on Simpsonwood. Highlights included:

- The task force employed business consultants to study the Retreat Center operations.
- A debt of \$6 million was due to SunTrust Bank in April of this year. Just six weeks ago the Georgia United Methodist Foundation agreed to refinance the entire debt.
- The Task Force has preliminarily concluded that the long-range operation of the Retreat Center at Simpsonwood is not financially viable.
- The Task Force has studied alternative uses for the Simpsonwood property and approached the board and management of Wesley Woods Senior Living, Inc. about the possibility of using the property for a continuing care retirement community. Wesley Woods is performing preliminary research on need for a CCRC in the Norcross area.
- A motion was made, and approved, to empower the Task Force to seek a legal ruling on whether the Conference may legally divide or sell the property.

### **Celebration of small membership churches**

The Parish Life Committee of the Office of Connectional Ministries lifted up the vital ministry of small membership churches and acknowledged that 75 percent of North Georgia churches have 150 or less in worship.

On January 1, the North Georgia UM Foundation and South Georgia UM Foundation merged to form the Georgia United Methodist Foundation. Highlights from the report included:

- A new addition of Socially Responsible investments
- The Foundation awarded 31 \$1,000 scholarships to United Methodist students this year

**75th anniversary of the Upper Room**

**Council on Finance and Administration Report**

The \$25,295,067 budget proposed by the Council on Finance and Administration was approved by the Annual Conference. This represents a decrease of \$614,933 over the 2010 budget.

**Stop Hunger Now**

The day ended with the sounds of clapping and cheering as hundreds of volunteers celebrated the completion of a meal assembly project for Stop Hunger Now. When the work was done, more than 200,230 meals were ready to be sent to feed school-age children in Nicaragua.

“This is something that people really get excited about,” said John Page, associate pastor of Athens First UMC, who helped organized the effort. “There is a great deal of joy and enthusiasm that is evident. I have overheard people saying this is the kind of project they want to bring to their churches.”

Indeed, approximately 250 volunteers – some in shirts and T-shirts, others still in suits from conference – went about their two-hour shifts with obvious joy. The cheered whenever a gong rang out, signifying another 5,000 meals had been completed, and occasionally broke into song.

Three conference rooms, with a combined length of approximately 40 yards, were needed to set up accommodate the tables of volunteers.

Teams of workers, each with thin blue hair nets or baseball caps, carefully measured out packages filled with rice and soy protein, fortified with 21 essential vitamins and supplements.

### **Friday, June 18, 2010**

#### **Good work results in good news coverage**

Thursday's "Stop Hunger Now" project at the North Georgia Annual Conference dominated the front page of Friday's Athens Banner-Herald. The 861-word story went into great detail about the volunteer effort at the Classic Center.

Excerpts from the Banner-Herald:

*In town for the annual meeting of the North Georgia Conference of the United Methodist Church, volunteers from across the state worked to package 200,000 meals for hungry children Thursday.*

*Sponsored with an anonymous \$50,000 donation to the feeding group Stop Hunger Now, teens and adults crowded around long tables and worked in an assembly line to measure and package dehydrated meals that will go next week to feed school children in Nicaragua.*

*Thursday's event was the largest that the Raleigh, N.C.-based hunger relief group has hosted in Georgia in its 12-year history. Smaller events at churches and Rotary clubs with around 40 volunteers have sent 10,000 meals to schools and disaster areas across the world. Stop Hunger Now plans to open an Atlanta facility by summer's end that will help local groups raise the money for the packaged meals.*

“The United Methodist Church continues to run through my life like the thread that forms a tapestry.”

He challenged the 662 people in attendance to make every effort to work for the good of others.

“What you do in your life sows the seeds that can improve the lives of future generations.”
